The Waste Management refuse and recycling collection rates for 2017 has been adjusted as

follows effective November 1, 2016:

\$17.27 per household per month

\$19.28 per household per month

\$16.55 per household per month
- > Landscape
\$97.54 per household per season

Trash & Yard Waste - Waste Management Guidelines:

All waste materials must be placed out at the curb for collection by 6:00am the day of your collection, but not before 5:00pm the day before your pick-up. **This includes yard waste bags and containers.**

All containers and any solid waste materials that are not collected must be removed from the curb by 8:00am the day after your scheduled collection.

All containers must be stored out of public view behind an enclosure.

REUSE-A-SHOE PROGRAM

Every year, across the globe, millions of pairs of shoes end up in landfills or disposed of in some way, creating a lot of waste. It is estimated that 85% or more of these unwanted items end up in our landfills, which here in the U.S. and around the world, are filling up fast.

With the pursuit of sustainability in mind, SWALCO developed a program to reuse those shoes and they have been offering the program for over a decade now. Many tons of shoes have been collected through this program to date, and, these tons, have all been recycled or reused.

At the November Board Meeting, 10 year old Nathaniel Kowalke petitioned the Board to see if they would be willing to participate in the Reuse-A-Shoe Program in conjunction with SWALCO. The Board agreed to participate.

The Reuse - A - Shoe collection box is in the lobby of the Village Hall. Shoes may be dropped off during regular business hours.

Keeping Pets Safe in Wintry Weather

Not only can winter be a time of illness and injury if people fail to take appropriate health and safety precautions, but harsh winter weather conditions can be tough on pets as well.

Salt and other chemicals used to melt snow and ice can irritate the pads of your pet's feet. Wipe the feet with a damp towel before your pet licks them and irritates its mouth. Trim excess fur from your pet's pads so that ice and snow do not accumulate between its toes which can cause discomfort.

Antifreeze is a deadly poison with a sweet taste, which may attract animals. Wipe up spills and store antifreeze out of reach. If possible, use antifreeze coolant made with propylene glycol. If this is swallowed in small amounts, it will not hurt pets.

Do not allow your dog to run freely on open ice. It can be difficult to judge the safety of the ice, and your dog could be at risk of falling through.

During the winter, it is best to keep your pets inside with the family. The happiest dogs are those that are taken out frequently for walks and exercise, but are kept inside the rest of the time. Dogs and cats crave human companionship and should be indoors with you and your family.

Radon Gas Testing Kits Available through the Health Department

January has been designated National Radon Action Month by the Environmental Protection Agency. In connection with this observance, the Lake County Health Department/Community Health Center is encouraging residents to check the radon levels of their homes or apartments in January or during the winter months.

"The best time to check for radon is during cold weather when windows and doors remain closed," said Mark Pfister, the Health Department's Interim Executive Director. "Radon increases your risk of lung cancer, so it is important to check the level in your home."

Short-term test kits are available through the Health Department for \$10.00. The cost includes return postage, laboratory analysis and interpretation by Health Department staff. Test kits are also available from area hardware and building supply stores.

Radon, an odorless and colorless gas naturally found in rock and soil, seeps into homes through cracks in the basement floor and foundation, crawl spaces, poorly sealed sump pumps, floor drains, porous cinder block walls and other foundation floor and wall penetrations. Although radon gas is measurable everywhere, the highest readings are normally found in the basement and first floor levels of homes and apartments.

"If radon is found in your home, it is important to contact a radon professional to assess and prevent the radon gas from continuing to enter your home," said Pfister.

REMINDERS

- ★ **Inoperable Vehicles** - It is a violation of the Village Ordinance to park or store a vehicle which is inoperable or unlicensed in residential driveways.
- ★ **Clear Paths** - As a courtesy to Village residents and guests, property owners are required to trim trees and shrubs that extend into the sidewalks and streets. People should be able to walk on the sidewalks without bumping into them.
- ★ **Building Permits** - If you are unsure whether or not your project requires a building permit, please call the Village Hall for confirmation.
Some projects that you may not know need permits include:
 - Hot water heater replacement
 - Air conditioning unit replacement
 - Furnace replacement
 - Interior remodeling
- ★ **Overnight Parking** - **There is no parking on Village streets between the hours of 2:00 am and 7:00 am. If you need to leave a car on the street overnight, you must call or email the Village Hall by 2:00 am. Leave a message including your name, address & the vehicle (s) license plate number (s). *** PLEASE DO NOT FORGET TO LEAVE THE LICENSE PLATE NUMBER (S)*****
- ★ **Pets and Pet Waste** - Pets are not permitted to roam the Village freely. All pets are required to be leashed when not on the owner's property. Allowing your dog to deposit waste on another resident's property or on Village sidewalks or streets and not picking up the waste is a violation of our Village Ordinance.

★ **Trash & Yard Waste** - Waste Management Guidelines:

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SNOW EVENT ENFORCEMENT

Village Ordinance No. 11-08-05 states that there is no parking of any vehicle on Village streets at any time within 12 hours after a snowfall of ONE INCH or more has occurred.

Village Ordinance No. 10-06-02 states that it is unlawful to interfere with, obstruct or tend to obstruct or render dangerous for passage any street.

These ordinances will be vigorously enforced. Violations will result in the issuance of a \$25.00 fine and / or towed at owner's expense.

Calling in a vehicle left on the road overnight during / after a snowfall of one inch or more will not excuse you from receiving a violation and parking ticket.

Due to the nature of the street layout in Mariner's Cove, the plowing service may unintentionally hit a mailbox or scrape a section of sod near the curb. If this happens, please report the incident to The Village President, Gary Beggan at 847.223.8422 during normal business hours or at gbeggan@sbcglobal.net or 847.223.5105 when the Village Hall is closed. Leave your name, street address and a contact method to facilitate follow-up action.

Please remember to shovel around your fire hydrant also.
