## Save money by recycling your second refrigerator

If you have an older, working second refrigerator or freezer parked in your garage keeping your soda pop or ice cream cold, it's probably costing you more money than you think. Did you know that it could use up to five times more electricity than a newer model, consuming nearly \$150 in energy each year?

With this in mind, it doesn't make sense to hold on to it, especially when ComEd will:

- Have it hauled away for free.
- Pay you \$25 per appliance.
- Dispose of it responsibly—dismantling it and recycling its parts in an environmentally responsible way.
- Pick up and recycle your old working room air conditioners along with your refrigerator or freezer

### FRIENDLY NEIGHBOR REMINDERS:

- ⇒ Please pick up dog waste
- ⇒ Do not obstruct the sidewalk path so that a person has to walk around cars parked in your driveway, toys, bikes or other obstacles

- ⇒ Barking dogs and dogs that wander onto your neighbors property are a nuisance to your neighbors. Pets are prohibited by Village ordinance to be off your property without a leash

# WEST NILE VIRUS

The Lake County Health Department is urging residents to protect themselves against West Nile Virus. Although no human cases of the disease have been reported over the past two years, it is still important for residents to protect themselves against mosquito bites and ensure the environment around them is not conducive to mosquito breeding. The West Nile Hotline has been re-activated for county residents to report dead birds, report areas of stagnant water, or to obtain more information on the signs and symptoms of West Nile encephalitis. ## **How can I help protect my family and myself from mosquitoes and the diseases they may carry?**

- Dispose of discarded tires, cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots or other unused similar water-holding containers that have accumulated on your property. Do not overlook containers that have become overgrown by vegetation.
- At least once per week, empty standing water from containers on your property, such as tire swings, or bird baths.
- Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water.
- Clean clogged roof gutters, particularly if the leaves from surrounding trees have a tendency to plug up the drains. Flooded roof gutters are easily overlooked but can produce hundreds of mosquitoes each season.
- Turn over plastic wading pools when not in use. A wading pool becomes a mosquito producer if it is not used on a regular basis.
- Turn over wheelbarrows and do not allow water to stagnate in bird baths. Change water in bird baths and wading pools on a weekly basis.
- Store boats covered or upside down, or remove rainwater weekly.
- Aerate ornamental pools or stock them with fish. Water gardens are fashionable but become major mosquito producers if they are allowed to stagnate.
- Clean and chlorinate swimming pools that are not being used. A swimming pool that is left unattended by a family that goes on vacation for a month can produce enough mosquitoes to result in neighborhood-wide complaints. Be aware that mosquitoes may breed in the water that collects on swimming pool covers.
- Keep drains, ditches and culverts free of grass clippings, weeds and trash so water will drain properly.
- Fill in low areas on your property to eliminate standing water. Ponds or streams where fish are present or the water is disturbed by current or wave action do not produce many mosquitoes.
- Minimize time spent outdoors between dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active.
- When it is necessary to be outdoors, apply insect repellent as indicated on the repellent label. The more DEET a product contains, the longer the repellent can protect against mosquito bites. However, concentrations higher than 50 percent do not increase the length of protection. For most situations, 10 percent to 25 percent DEET is adequate. Apply repellents to clothes whenever possible; apply sparingly to exposed skin if label permits. Consult a physician before using repellents on young children.
