October is National Cyber Security Awareness Month

IEMA encourages people to learn how to avoid cyber attacks

Governor Bruce Rauner has proclaimed October National Cybersecurity Awareness Month to highlight the importance of understanding and avoiding cyber risks. During October, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) is joining with county and municipal emergency management agencies to increase awareness of online risks and provide tips on what people can do to prevent problems.

“Computers and mobile devices give us access to a wealth of information and help us connect with people near and far,” said IEMA Director James K. Joseph. “Unfortunately, there are people out there who continuously seek ways to cause harm and create havoc through these devices. The best way to defend against cyber attacks is by arming yourself with information about the risks and learning steps you can take to reduce the chance of being a victim of cybercrime.”

Joseph said the Ready Illinois website at www.Ready.Illinois.gov provides links to information and tips to help people minimize the risk of being a cybercrime victim. Some of those tips include the following:

- Configure your computer securely Use privacy and security settings in your software, email system and web browsers. Regularly update your anti-virus software to identify and thwart new strains of malicious software.
- Keep software and operating systems updated Install all software updates as soon as they are offered; using the “auto update” setting is the best way to ensure timely updates.
- Use strong passwords Cybercrimi-

nals use automated programs that will try every word in the dictionary in a few minutes. When creating a password, use at least 10 characters, with a combination of uppercase and lowercase letters, numbers and symbols.

- Be cautious about links and attachments Even communications you receive that appear to be from friends and family may contain links to malicious sites, so be careful when clicking on links in those messages. When in doubt, delete it.

“Cybersecurity is no longer just an IT issue – it is a public safety issue,” stated Kirk Lonbom, Interim Secretary at Illinois Department of Innovation & Technology. “The month of October provides an excellent opportunity to raise awareness of cybersecurity risks and promote online safety.”



COMED’S HOURLY PRICING PROGRAM

Enrollment in this innovative program requires the installation of an electric meter capable of measuring and recording electric usage in hourly intervals. Other than your current monthly standard metering charge, there is no additional monthly meter lease fee for this hourly recording meter and you will not pay a fee for exchanging the meter. The exemption from the monthly meter lease fee and the meter exchange fee only applies to the first meter.

SNOW EVENT ENFORCEMENT

Village Ordinance No. 11-08-05 states that there is no parking of any vehicle on Village streets at any time within 12 hours after a snowfall of ONE INCH or more has occurred.

Village Ordinance No. 10-06-02 states that it is unlawful to interfere with, obstruct or tend to obstruct or render dangerous for passage any street.

These ordinances will be vigorously enforced. Violations will result in the issuance of a \$25.00 fine and / or towed at owner’s expense.

Calling in a vehicle left on the road overnight during / after a snowfall of one inch or more will not excuse you from receiving a violation and parking ticket.

Due to the nature of the street layout in Mariner’s Cove, the plowing service may unintentionally hit a mailbox or scrape a section of sod near the curb. If this happens, please report the incident to The Village President, Gary Beggan at 847.223.8422 during normal business hours or at gbeggan@sbcglobal.net or 847.223.5105 when the Village Hall is closed. Leave your name, street address and a contact method to facilitate follow-up action.

Please remember to shovel around your fire hydrant also.



REMINDERS

★ **Inoperable Vehicles** - It is a violation of the Village Ordinance to park or store a vehicle which is inoperable or unlicensed in residential driveways.

★ **Clear Paths** - As a courtesy to Village residents and guests, property owners are required to trim trees and shrubs that extend into the sidewalks and streets. People should be able to walk on the sidewalks without bumping into them.

★ **Building Permits** - If you are unsure whether or not your project requires a building permit, please call the Village Hall for confirmation.

Some projects that you may not know need permits include:

- Hot water heater replacement
- Air conditioning unit replacement
- Furnace replacement
- Interior remodeling

★ **Overnight Parking** - There is no parking on Village streets between the hours of 2:00 am and 7:00 am. If you need to leave a car on the street overnight, you must call or email the Village Hall by 2:00 am. Leave a message including your name, address & the vehicle (s) license plate number (s). *** **PLEASE DO NOT FORGET TO LEAVE THE LICENSE PLATE NUMBER (S)*****

★ **Pets and Pet Waste** - Pets are not permitted to roam the Village freely. All pets are required to be leashed when not on the owner’s property. Allowing your dog to deposit waste on another resident’s property or on Village sidewalks or streets and not picking up the



waste is a violation of our Village Ordinance.

★ **Burning** - Dry leaves, brush, branches under 1 1/2” in diameter, and yard waste may be burned between November 1 and November 30.

* **Burning is permitted between the hours of 9 am and 3 pm only.**

* **Burning is only allowed in a fireproof barrel or other receptacle that is elevated above ground by at least 6” but no more than 24”.**

* **Burning is not permitted: When wind is in excess of 15 mph;**

Within 20’ of any building or structure;

Within 25’ of any wetland, lake or other body of water, or Lake County Forest Preserve property;



On Village streets, sidewalks or other public right of way.

- * **Fire must be attended at all times by a person 16 years of age or older.**
- * **Must have a water source and adequate means of delivering water immediately adjacent to the fire.**

★ **Trash & Yard Waste** - Waste Management Guidelines:

the day of your collection, but not before 5:00pm the day before your pickup. **This includes yard waste bags and containers.** All containers and any solid waste materials that are not collected must be removed from the curb by 8:00am the day after your scheduled collection.



Violation of these Village Ordinances will result in fines which will increase each time a violation is committed from \$50.00 to \$750.00. Call the Village with any questions or complaints.

PIERS

In order to avoid damage to your pier, it is strongly recommended that you remove your pier from the lake before the water freezes.

THIRD LAKE DAM
